## The Catholic Life of the School

Mrs Gerschler and her RE team continue to ensure varied, pertinent, and extensive opportunities to ensure the formation of both students and staff.

- 'Little Way Week'. This started on 2<sup>nd</sup> October and is inspired by St Thérèse of Lisieux, patron of mission. As a child, St Thérèse dreamed of being a missionary. With age she understood that very few of us are called to make big and radical gestures, but through small, loving actions we too can deliver God's love to the world. Heads of Year shared the 'Five Fact Assembly' that encourages our community to follow her 'Little Way'. The idea is we all do the small actions to help others we will be able to experience the love of God. Over the week, teachers received 'thank you notes' and forms shared ideas that could help to make other people's week that bit better.
- Mary's Meals and World Porridge Day. This was celebrated on 10<sup>th</sup> October. #### **Mental Health Day**

October 10<sup>th</sup> was World Mental Health Day. St Damian's proudly joined forces with ITV to share the nationwide extra homework set by Ant and Dec. Every child was given the homework sheet to take home, we are asking parents to ask your child about the homework as it is an ice-breaker to get children to talk about how they are feeling. The sheet suggests ways that both children and adults can start a difficult conversation and follows the St Damian's ideal of "If you can help a child, you don't have to spend years repairing an adult". Remember the mantra... mental health can affect any student [Indeed any adult too!] at any time!



#### **Teaching and Learning Update**

At the beginning of each academic year, teachers at St Damian's are tasked with reviewing their appraisal targets and setting themselves new objectives for the coming year. These appraisals are used to guide improvements in their teaching and to reinforce teaching excellence and personal professional development. With that in mind, Mrs Heenan, our Teaching and Learning lead, has introduced a new professional development model called 'The Research Model'. In essence, teachers become researchers in improving their own teaching and learning; they take an aspect of teaching they may want to develop and set up or join a research group — with a view that research is a process for improvement. We are very much looking forward to examining the high-quality academic research that our teachers are undertaking to continue to deliver outstanding teaching in our classrooms.

#### **Parents and Issues**

Over the past few weeks, a small number of parents have either spoken to staff or emailed school regarding some 'issues', some of which are extremely complex. Some of these have caused staff unnecessary stress and upset. This isn't acceptable at any workplace, never mind in our Catholic community where respect is our core value. As headteacher I can say, with absolute confidence, that all my staff work extremely hard for *every* child and genuinely do their best for them. I am inundated with many emails that praises their work and this is testament to their professionalism, dedication and kindness. If you speak to my staff, please be considerate and kind. If there is an issue that can't be resolved, and this is a possibility, please contact me and I will respond.

Furthermore, can I clarify 2 embedded expectations that have been in place for over 10 years.

- After school detentions. These are not optional and can't be substituted for lunch time detentions.
- Phones. If phones are out, they will be confiscated and placed at reception for the parent to collect.

Both of the above are transparent, fair and accepted and applicable to all students. Failure to comply is likely to result in a suspension.

## **Vapes**

Statistics show there is a national issue with children vaping. Any child who brings a vape into school or uses a vape in school will be sanctioned, and likely suspended. This includes any child seen vaping when in their uniform, either on a bus or walking to and from school. It is illegal for any child under the age of 18 to vape. This is because of the serious health implications that high levels of nicotine can have on a child. Students are educated on the dangers of vaping, but your continued support is appreciated.

#### Yr11 Update

I am delighted with the attitudes of the vast majority of Yr11 students. They really are a credit to both themselves, and you, as their parents. They have worked really hard this half term. Their focus in lessons and general conduct around school has been overwhelmingly positive. Over the half term break students need to balance revising for their upcoming Mocks but also to have a well-deserved break. Their mock exams start on 27<sup>th</sup> November.













As a school we have reviewed the targets of all students in Yr11. This is due to a combination of factors including receiving more up to date information nationally regarding progression from KS2 starting points. We are fiercely proud of our academic achievements and all target changes are aspirational and are done so without compromising our high standards.

Over the past few weeks in Yr11 assembly, students have had the opportunity to listen to post-16 Colleges and courses. This should raise their aspirations and get them thinking about their futures. Mr Gregory will be running a History intervention class during the half term break; he will let the relevant students know.

#### **Curriculum Updates**

A] What is your child learning? The St Damian's curriculum

As a parent, it is helpful if you know what your child is learning. I mentioned in my last letter that we have recently revamped the Curriculum area of the school website. Furthermore, look at our Subjects link to find further information about what your child will be learning throughout the year.













## B] Assessing the taught Curriculum

Over the next few weeks assessments will be taking place which will test the student's knowledge of what they have learnt. Yr10 starts 20<sup>th</sup> November, Yr8 starts 27<sup>th</sup> November, Yr7 starts 4<sup>th</sup> December and Yr9 on the 8<sup>th</sup> January. Your child should be revising towards these assessments. These exams are linear and therefore will include up to 25% of previously learnt content. For example, a Yr8 History Assessment will include approximately 75% of content studied since September and then up to 25% of content learnt in year 7. This is so that we revisit previously taught material.

## C] Reports

You should have received a 'Standards Checkpoint' report. This is a snapshot of how your child has been doing in terms of trying their best in lessons, with homework and their behaviour. As a parent, look to see if the gradings say 'Always' or 'Often'? If so, praise your child. If gradings say 'Sometimes' or 'Rarely' please discuss possible reasons for this with your child so that you can support them. Yr11 will receive a similar report but will include Current Working Grade and Predicted Grades. The Predicted Grade is what the teacher believes your child will achieve if they continue to work as they currently are doing. If this is lower than their target, please ask your child why. Are they revising? Are they completing all their homework? Is their effort in lessons 'always' or 'often'?

# D] Curriculum Spotlight on Humanities: Geography and History

- ✓ Geography: The department were delighted with the GCSE outcomes of our 2023 leavers, with 82% of students achieving at least a Grade 4, and 1 in 3 students achieving a Grade 7 9. This is the direct result of quality teaching and the hard work and determination of our students. We are hopeful for another successful year for the class of 2024! Through innovative approaches to teaching, the geography department empowers students to understand the different complexities of our everchanging world. We instill in students the deep appreciation for the world around them, from its diverse cultures and natural landscapes to the importance of sustainable practices in order to protect our Common Home. The department is dedicated to fostering a sense of global citizenship that extends beyond the classroom, to inspire the next generation of geographers.
- ✓ History: The GCSE results were outstanding with nearly 40% of the cohort achieving grade 7 or higher which was well above the national average. Just as exceptional was that 82% of students achieved a grade 5 or better, 20% above the national average. The key to this success is quality teaching of a knowledge rich curriculum alongside high expectations of behaviour, homework, and participation in lessons. Many learners choose to study history at Advanced Level. Our AQA GCSE course covers a wide range of topics from the work of Hippocrates in Ancient Greece to the collapse of World Peace in the 1930s. All KS3, students are encouraged to become strong independent learners and to question historical interpretations using their contextual knowledge.

Our *Ebacc outcomes* [a measurement of an academic curriculum] are well above the national average, which is testament to high quality teaching and learning and excellent student-teacher relationships. *E*]

## **PE Update**

Our PE department continues to be busy over the past half term and the provision for extracurricular activities are off to a great start with football and netball this half term. Our boys football teams continue to be successful with Yrs 7, 8, 9 and 10 all winning their first round Tameside cup matches. The senior and Yr9 netball teams played well to win their first-round matches of the season against Mossley Hollins and the Yr7 and Yr8 development netball teams show great promise, and we have high hopes for the next round of friendlies.



















### **Excellent Personal Development Opportunities**

✓ ASPIRE Day: On Monday, our students engaged with our termly 'ASPIRE DAY'. All students were educated on a range of pertinent issues. The Yr7 focus included learning about mental health and anti-bullying, Yr8 was Mindfulness and Meditation, Yr9 was body positivity and consensual relationships whereas Yr10 focus included sexting and building social relationships. All these topics were delivered at an age-appropriate level and was a blend of workshops, presentations and external speakers. The aim of ASPIRE days is to provide a holistic education to support student's personal development, resilience and general character building.



Yr11 had talks from various colleges and employers from a range of sectors. Yr11 are currently applying for colleges, so these visits help to aid them in this process. It also gave them an insight into different careers they may not have thought of looking into! As always, our great children rose to the occasion and I was delighted with the conduct of the students and the feedback from the external speakers about your wonderful children.

- ✓ Musical Theatre Group: Established under the tutelage of Miss Brookes and Mr McArdle, this has been a transformative platform for students to explore their passion for performing arts. Through rigorous rehearsals, dedicated mentoring and collaborative teamwork, students have honed their singing, acting and dancing skills, showcasing incredible growth in their artistic abilities. As well as developing a deep appreciation for the arts, it has also nurtured self-confidence and discipline. Students have explored a variety of repertoire ranging from established musicals such as 'Annie' to modern shows such as 'Hamilton'. I am delighted to see students blossoming into accomplished performers, fostering a lifelong love for musical theatre. Long may it continue!
- ✓ Student Council: I would like to congratulate our newest members of the Student Council in Yr7 and Yr8. On 2<sup>nd</sup> October our student council delivered presentations to our prospective parents as part of our Open Evening experience.
