St Damian's recognises the outstanding hard work and dedication of all the health workers in our Alumni who have worked tirelessly to support others in our communities both at local, regional & national level. A huge thank you to you all. You have been truly inspirational! We asked some of our Alumni to share their experiences during the pandemic. Thank you to Ann-Marie and Niamh who have shared their experiences with us.

Assistant Practitioner in General Practice

What does your role involve?

I was a student at St. Damian's between 1999 and 2004.

I have worked in the NHS since leaving school in various different roles and in different areas. I have experience of working in General Practice, Cancer Services, Emergency Department and Primary Care Network.

Since completing my foundation degree, I currently work as an Assistant Practitioner in General Practice. This role involves seeing patients face-to-face in clinics and providing care, support and education to patients in North Manchester. I carry out reviews for long-term chronic diseases, health checks, irrigation, weight management, smoking cessation, blood tests and observations amongst many other things. It is a deprived and diverse area. S0 health promotion is a big part of my job.

What has been the impact and what have been the challenges of working during the COVID-19 pandemic?

The pandemic has impacted me in many ways. We are unable to perform certain tests on patients, we have to wear PPE every day, isolate if in contact with a positive case, test twice a week and clean the room and equipment after every patient.



The challenges for me have been that my children have had to isolate frequently due to a bubble closure at school, trying to juggle a childcare and work has been tough. Also, the worry of contracting Covid at work and potentially taking it home to my family has been a worry, especially as my husband was on the shielding list. The NHS has struggled more than ever with demands and extra pressures and also staff shortages, we were unable to take annual leave in the first wave and it was tiring.

The positives for me are that I have learn so much during the pandemic, which will benefit me in future if we ever experience a similar situation (hopefully not!), it has also been an honour to work in the covid vaccination clinics and vaccinating the care homes and housebound patients. A few patients cried happy tears when they received their vaccines and the care home staff cheered each time a resident received theirs, to give them a little hope and protection after a very challenging year was very humbling and fulfilling for me!

What about the future?

Next month I am going back to University to study for a degree in Nursing as an apprenticeship and I cannot wait for my new adventure!

Junior Doctor

What does your role involve?

As a junior Doctor you're often one of the first people a patient will see. For a junior role you have a large responsibility for the patients in your care. Particularly when on call or during a night shift. You are often expected to have formed your own list of potential diagnoses and management plan, whilst also knowing your own limits and asking your seniors for help whenever you are unsure. In all aspects of medical care, being a good follower in a team is equally important to being a good leader.

How has the COVID-19 pandemic impacted you?

In terms of personal impact, I have been very lucky. Whilst not having an in-person graduation wasn't ideal, it really pales in comparison to how others have been impacted and I'm definitely mindful of that.

What have been the challenges of working during the COVID-19 pandemic?

Witnessing difficult discussions with patients and their families. I understand how hard it must be to comprehend the severity of this pandemic when most people are fortunately so far removed from it. However, when you see it first hand, people not being able to be at their relative's bedside at

solemn times such as results of a terminal diagnosis, or even at times that are meant to be happy like the birth of their first grandchild for example, that was hard to see.

What have been the positives?

A little kindness goes a long way, and despite how much everyone's lives changed drastically during pandemic, it seemed to bring out so much good in a lot of people. I hope these attitudes continue! Another positive I have seen, especially on social media has been a more open dialogue on the importance of mental wellbeing. Whilst some people have learnt new skills or increased physical exercise (another positive!), having just about got through this time doing your normal routine is not something to be overlooked. it's an achievement you should be proud of.

St Damian's Staff has many Alumni actively serving in the school. This demonstrates that the strong attachment and love of the school that has continued to grow from time as a pupil at St. Damian's to time as an employee ensuring that the next generations of St. Damian's pupils continue to grow, develop and be inspired by the unique ethos of St. Damian's Catholic Community.

In our second Alumni Newsletter, Ms Guilfoyle shares her journey from St. Damian's pupil to Faculty Leader, Physical Education.

I stepped through the doors of St Damian's in September 1992 as a very little Yr7 with an enormous, oversized blazer and energy to match. I was described by one teacher at parents evening 'an as absolute nuisance' and 'potential superstar' by another. So, having returned to St Damian's as a staff member in 2004, I wondered which version of me would be remembered?

St Damian's was always a school that offered a range opportunities experiences. This was perfect for me as an enthusiastic 'joiner-inner' because I was encouraged to be involved in all aspects of school life including sports teams, school productions, class masses, assemblies, paired reading programs and prefect responsibilities.

Having done my best impression of Gina Gee at the Yr11 leavers 1996 Christmas concert and enjoyed what I believe was the first ever St Damian's prom in July 1997, I joined Oldham 6th Form College to study A Levels. I studied English, Biology and PE, but was unsure as to what to do next!

I decided a year out from study was what I needed to refocus my future choices as I was torn between nursing and teaching. My decision to wait was the right one. I used the year to learn to drive, train as a lifeguard, work part time jobs and to travel to the USA to work on summer camps before returning home to study PE/Sports Science and English Literature Chester at University.



The many sporting experiences provided at university came thick and with fast: more opportunities to play, travel and coach sport abroad, find part and time employment at local football and swimming clubs - all of which guided me towards a career in teaching.

After graduating and qualifying as a PE teacher, I started my career at Saddleworth School in 2003 before joining St Damian's in 2004. Here, my own teachers became colleagues and in time my own pupils have become colleagues. I have had the privilege of teaching my own family members alongside the children of my own St Damian's classmates; all of whom embrace and appreciate the family feel that has continued. At an open evening a few years ago, I chatted to a Yr6 parent, herself a past pupil who noted that 'the building might be different, but St Damian's is still the same'.

Teaching is incredibly challenging but forever rewarding and I would consider myself privileged to have experienced these rewards as both a pupil and a member of staff at St Damian's.

Each year when we welcome the new intake of Y7's to 'big school', I always like to keep an eye out for the ones who are likely to be a 'little bit of nuisance' but always our future 'superstars'.

The 'St Damian's Way' is true. However, it is not a 'thing' that was ever written down, it is not a quote or a specific ideal, it's not our motto – it's the continued legacy of the special St Damian's experience, and once you know, you know!
