This year, the St Damian's community was met with the loss of our chair of governors. Mrs Jones, better known as Betty, was a loving, compassionate and integral part of our community. Betty worked selflessly and relentlessly throughout her life to serve and honour St Damian's as a place of hope and a centre of education. She played an instrumental role in the transformation of St Damian's into an outstanding school. She had been involved with our school community for over 40 years. The lifelong Manchester United fan began at the school as a bursar and became part of the Senior Leadership Team. Since 2011 she had served as the Chair of Governors and provided a strong leadership to the school.

About our community, Betty once said "It's like one big family - I always say we're a family. Everybody works for one another."

She was a familiar face to everyone in St Damian's, she not only attended Governor's meetings but was a regular visitor to the school, attending many different events during the year, both during the day and in the evenings.

During her time as Chair of Governors St Damian's won many different accolades, and Betty enjoyed celebrating our success in Manchester, Liverpool, Birmingham and London including the 'National Governor of the Year Award in 2021' and 'Best Secondary School of the Year'.

Betty's funeral was held at St Christopher's Church and was attended by family, friends and colleagues. It was a fitting tribute to a wonderful lady who meant the world to all those who knew her. At the funeral, St Damian's was represented by our Choir, whose singing was sublime, a guard of honour who proudly lined the entry into Church and not forgetting all other pupils and members of staff who lined Lees Road in immaculate school uniform, with their heads bowed as Betty made her final journey. Betty's memory will live on, she played a significant role in the planning of our new building and more recently the 'Elizabeth Jones MBE Literacy Hub' which now stands proudly within our grounds. Betty would have been exceptionally proud and overjoyed to hear that we were graded 'Outstanding' by Oftsed again this summer. This accolade is yet another testament to the leadership and support that Betty provided us with.

The Year 10 Language Leaders, made up of a range of GCSE French and Spanish pupils, have been working hard with Miss Smith this year to achieve a Leadership qualification certified by SLQ Sports Leaders. They have embodied the St. Damian's Way through promoting a culture of diversity, inclusivity, and mutual respect. From making posters to advertise language-learning resources, to delivering short French and Spanish sessions to Year 8 forms, this year's Language Leaders have participated actively in the school community. Most recently, to achieve their leadership qualification, they planned and led a Spanish taster session to a group of Year 5s from St. Christopher's. This was a fantastic afternoon that represented their passion for languages and for serving others in the community. Below are some comments from some Language Leaders:



'Hi my name is Brooke and I am a member of the Language Leaders. Whilst being a part of this group, I have enjoyed every moment of it. Recently, we did a language taster session for Year 5s and planned activities for them to learn some Spanish. This went very well and both us and the Year 5s enjoyed it very much. I would definitely recommend joining Language Leaders in Year 10.'

'Bonjour! Je m'appelle Daniel et je suis un 'Language Ambassador' de St. Damian's! I believe that the most I've gotten out of being a Language Leader is that I have acquired the skill to teach others and adapt to learning from that. As I study French, I've forgotten quite a lot of Spanish - but I've been able to rekindle my knowledge with this experience. When teaching the Year 8s, I felt quite nervous at first but the pupils were able to keep us entertained and made the mood less awkward. This was completely new for me, so when I heard we'd be teaching Year 5 pupils also, I felt quite uneasy. This wasn't the case when it came to the day however. It was very fun to be a leader in both circumstances, and the tasks allowed us to enjoy the process.'



LET'S TALK ABOUT SEND

It is vital that we have healthy and honest discussions about special educational needs and disabilities (otherwise known as SEND). My aim with this segment of the newspaper is to celebrate people with SEND and to normalise 'talking about SEND' so that we can learn to have empathy for one another. However, it is also vital that we respect each other's protected characteristics and we do not ask personal questions about needs and disabilities. Finally, I would like to thank Mrs Allmand for being so open and honest about her Dyslexia. You are a brilliant role model and a true testament to the success that pupils with SEND can achieve.

What is Dyslexia? Dyslexia is a learning disability which affects skills involved in reading, spelling and writing. However, dyslexia does not affect intelligence.

I was diagnosed with dyslexia when I was 7 years old when I was showing signs of high intelligence but struggling to read. Then I was reassessed before by GCSE'S when I was 15 to gain extra time in my GCSE exam's.

My learning needs has not stopped me achieving my A-levels, degree and PGCE but I did need support to achieve these goals. My difficulties include spelling, reading and cognitive memory overload.

Everything I write needs to be spell checked and I do struggle if pupils ask 'Miss how do you spell' but google dictionary is my BFF.

I have to continue to improve my reading and I make sure I read a lot in my spare time. I am currently enjoying The Rising Tide by Ann Cleeves. I love murder mysteries.

In regard to my memory, I have to write everything down for me to remember/process the information. I have always found that I am exhausted at the end of the day and need a lot of sleep. I think that is because my mind is working 10x harder to remember, understand and process all the information I see and hear throughout the day.

I have found that my SEND need has made me a very creative and adaptive person. I have naturally developed strategies to over come barriers to learning. I think that is why I love being a teacher. I enjoy finding different ways for pupils to learn.

After Calvin's passing, we held a special assembly for year 10 and we invited Calvin's parents back into school to join in with our celebration of their son's life. Year 10 spoke about the memories that they had shared with Calvin and let go of balloons in his memory.

Calvin was a good friend of mine, he was funny all the time, loved history (maybe a little too much) but always looked out for me. I first met him when I was in 7X2 Drama and I had no one to join a group with but he came up to me and we performed together and ever since then we became friends and we would meet up every day. He fought strong and showed courage on the last days of his life and lightened up the mood even though everyone knew what was going to eventually happen. Calvin was a friend that can never be replaced and will always have a place in our hearts.
