•Our Interfaith Event was an excellent occasion to connect with people from within the local community. This event included members of the parish, Oldham interfaith forum, faith leaders from both Great Academy and St Christopher's Primary. Our GIFT teams planned and led the entire event. We believe Interfaith dialogue is crucial for all communities and we are committed to ensuring that we play our part in living out Pope Francis' message of fraternity.

•Our Advent Charites this year reflect the theme of 'Hope for all'. St Damian's is a beacon of hope, and we

Safeguarding Updates

Staff Training. All staff have been introduced to our new safeguarding software, 'CPOMs'. This will help
support students and help keep them safe. CPOMs allows staff to raise incidents regarding students
and their wellbeing and ensure appropriate actions, if necessary, are taken. Safeguarding is our
number one priority, and our new system will elevate our already well embedded practice. During staff
training everyone was given a piece of a jigsaw which meant nothing until all staff came together to
create a 'big picture', this simply illustrated that when we work together, we are stronger, and it is our
strength that fosters our exceptionally robust safeguarding standards.



Sexual Harassment. Mrs Brophy has delivered assemblies to all years about sexual harassment, focusing on being able to identify what is meant by sexual harassment as well as teaching our young people not to tolerate offensive words and actions as 'banter'. Sadly, our children are exposed to so much sexualised behaviour, for example, through social media, that some have become desensitised. However, for the avoidance of doubt, sexual harassment in all its guises, including 'banter' is not acceptable. I encourage all students to report any incidents to staff. We are a strong and united community where respect is our core value.

Teaching & Learning Update

During November, our Subject Leaders completed Learning Walks in their departments to ensure that our high standards are maintained in the classroom, ensuring our students are receiving great learning experiences. Our learning walks are a fantastic opportunity for Subject Leads to observe our teachers do what they do best – teach! Our T&L Cycle ensures that teachers continue to be reflective practitioners, challenging students through effective questioning, explicit instruction and challenging misconceptions. The relationships that the staff develop with students allows them to thrive. Teaching and Learning is certainly at the heart of all we do.

Standards and Expectations

For a long period of time now, I am proud to say that the behaviour of our great students is a joy to behold. However, now and again, I need to reinforce our high standards and expectations. Standards are a key element of why St Damian's is a great school environment. Let me briefly outline some of these:

- ✓ Vaping: Any student vaping in school is likely to be suspended and this will affect end of year trips
- Jewellery: No jewellery is allowed, for example bracelets and earrings
- *Phones*: Not allowed out whilst on school premises, including after school intervention/homework clubs
- *Detentions*: These are not optional. Once given, only I can remove detentions
- ✓ Drugs and Knives. These are banned. If caught in school, it is likely to be a permanent exclusion

Can I thank parents for supporting the school and upholding these high standards.

Yr11 Update

Firstly, the vast majority of Yr11 are working really hard and they should be congratulated. Sadly, a small number are not working to the best of their ability either in school or at home. This will be reflected in their grade next August and it will have a massive bearing on their futures. Mrs Kelly did a special assembly for key Yr11 students focusing on 'never giving up' and striving to be the best they could be. In a prior assembly to this I focused on the fact that 'there is no substitute for hard work'.

- Mocks: These have started in earnest. It is important that your child is preparing for these by studying each evening for between 2-3 hours in a quiet place that is conducive to learning.
- Intervention: Over the past few weeks, Yr11 students have been attending after school intervention. This intervention has been postponed for the duration of the Mocks but will continue in January. Overall, I was really impressed with the attitudes of the students. Please pass on my gratitude!
- Independent Learning at Home. It is imperative that parents are supporting their children and ensuring, as a minimum, their child is doing sufficient work at home [2-3 hours], a quiet space to study and to take an 'interest' in their studies. Please don't under-estimate the influence you can have on their motivation to achieve well.
- Attendance: Since September, the overall attendance of Yr11 students up to and including 29th November has been 93.9%. There are a significant number of students whose attendance is too low. There is a strong correlation between good attendance and good student achievement. To illustrate



the importance of attendance the progress of students in 2023 with 95% plus attendance was **0.82**, while the progress of students below 90% attendance was **-0.95**. This is a massive difference in student GCSE outcomes which will have a big impact on your child's future.



• *Geography Fieldtrip:* Our Geography students visited Salford Quays to undertake a fieldwork investigation into the impacts of **urban regeneration**. They successfully collected their own data to investigate the environmental quality of Salford Quays. This is in preparation for their Paper 3 GCSE examination in the coming months. The



students persevered in adverse weather conditions [Storm Babet 😌] and Mr Stoneley said they were a *"credit to the school"*. Great to hear!

- *Prom.* This is by invitation *only*. It is paramount that both attendance and punctuality are at least 'good'. A small, but significant, number of students are regularly arriving to school late or have poor attendance. These students will be informed that they need to improve their punctuality and attendance or I will withdraw their invitation.
- Lucky Winner. Last week Mrs Turbatu was delighted with the attendance and positive attitude of students in the sessions prior to the mocks. Many students, including those not invited to the first round of intervention, completed a challenging online Literature assignment on SENECA. I decided to put these names in a hat and reward one student with a free ticket to the Prom. The lucky winner was Ellie Donnelly. Well done Ellie. Watch this space for future winners!!
- Yr11 Parents' Evening: As usual, this was well attended by parents and there was a real buzz in the hall. There were 112 questionnaire responses on the evening. 110 of these would recommend the school, and 2 wouldn't. Sadly, the 2 parents who wouldn't recommend the school did not put their names on the sheet and this has meant I can't contact them to listen to their 'concerns'. Furthermore, one of the parents who wouldn't recommend the school was overwhelmingly positive and agreed with most of the questions. All comments will be on the website https://www.stdamians.co.uk/parents-evening-feedback. Below are some comments for your perusal.

"Very happy with the school and how well xxx has been treated by students and staff"

"Thank you. Great school" "Fab school"

"Thank you for your help and encouragement and believing in my child"

"Amazing school. Amazing teachers. XXX is doing amazing. Thank you all"

"So proud my child attends St Damian's"

I loved and appreciated all the positive comments, but my favourite was the following;

"I have been lucky enough for the last 7 years to have been part of the St Damian's school community. I hope this partnership will continue for another 5 years as my youngest has just applied"

Overall, I have been highly impressed with the attitudes of the vast majority of the Yr11 students. Long may this continue. They should all be **'fired up and ready to go'**. This bodes well for the Mock exams and beyond. Mrs Harrison, HOY 11, is always available to support. There are **83** school days before the GCSE exams start for some on 7th May 2024 [Construction] and **85** school days before they start for all students on the 9th May 2024 [RE].



Class of 2023: National Data

In October the Government published the annual national GCSE statistics. See table below. As you would expect from a high achieving outstanding school, St Damian's was well above **ALL** the Tameside and national averages. These GCSE outcomes are the by-product of high expectations and quality teaching alongside student's hard work and focus. I am extremely proud of my staff who work tirelessly to ensure such great results and of the positive attitudes of the students. In fact, our Progress 8 measure, that 'measures' the value added from KS2 of 8 different subjects, was the **BEST** ever. It was categorised as **'well above average'**, the highest available. That is a remarkable achievement and is testament to the great staff here.

Attendance

For years St Damian's attendance has always been *well above national averages*. Attendance is vital for students achieving their potential, builds confidence, social and emotional development and provides a safe environment. Our mantra for attendance is **'Every Day Matters'**. It really does. In reality, most children do not catch-up on missed learning. Furthermore, there is an increasing number of holiday requests and rarely, if ever, do I authorise these. However, despite being well above average the attendance is not as high as it was pre-Covid. I ask that parents encourage good attendance. At St Damian's we promote and reward good attendance. Our attendance team work diligently to ensure that attendance is a key priority. Below shows St Damian's attendance figures compared with national figures for the first half term. For the avoidance of doubt, attendance at school correlates strongly with academic outcomes or 'success'.

Annual Greater Manchester Beewell Survey

Past surveys indicate our students are significantly happier about their lives and future prospects, when compared to other students in the Greater Manchester area.

They are demonstrating high levels of resilience and enthusiasm and have quickly established great relationships with their peers and staff. 
Staff Profiles

Curriculum Update: Spotlight on Religious Education

The RE department's motto is that we are '*The Core of the Core Curriculum, a Christ centred, highly academic, and nurturing department*'. Excellent teaching, alongside our delightful students, ensures RE outcomes are consistently strong. Our 2023 outcomes showed students achieved 84% grade 9 - 4 with 40% of students achieving grades 9 - 7. This included 13 grade 9s. The average grade was a Grade 6. These results are simply great! A strong KS3 curriculum is the foundation to this achievement, building up the key knowledge components that drive progress at KS4. Setting high expectations and by creating a safe positive learning environment ensures that our students receive the very best catholic education. I am delighted to report that the RE staff, led by Mrs Gerschler, are committed to our student's faith formation academic success, and instil values that enable our students to flourish!





Our PSHE/RSE Curriculum

Miss Bury continues to develop and update our PSHE curriculum. To enrich this, she led on hosting another successful ASPIRE Day last half term. The pertinent theme was 'Mental Health: Respect for Yourself and Others". Mental health issues are increasing and our ASPIRE day was designed to educate students on mental health, including signposting students towards additional support. We invited in expert external visitors to lead sessions and workshop led sessions, including educating on the impact of drugs and alcohol. The feedback received from these agencies, about our school, staff and students was fantastic! For example, the CGL Practitioner said "Lovely school, engaged in issues facing young people" and "students are very polite" and the workshop facilitator from 2020 Dreams stated "Great staff, great students, great school". It is always nice to get external validation about our great school!

Our Relationships and Sex Education **[RSE]** is taught as part of the PSHE curriculum to all years. Update on Students' Personal Development

Again, last month there was a plethora of varied activities that build character, develop resilience and instil values ensuring that we are delivering a true 'holistic' education. I ask that you encourage your child to participate in these extra-curricular opportunities. Enjoy reading!

- Form Time Pastoral Theme. Last half term the theme was 'Tolerance'. This is a key value at St Damian's and our students explore why 'Tolerance' is important within society. Students engaged in a variety of activities, led by Form Captains, to explore when tolerance may be required and how this also links with our golden rule of 'Mutual Respect'. A special mention goes to 9ABM who led an assembly on 'Tolerance', which involved every member of the form. This half term the theme is 'Nurture' which is an aim of our proud Catholic community. • STEM trip to Loreto 6th form: These Yr10 leaders enjoyed a visit to Loreto 6th Form to watch an Institute of Physics lecture about the 'Volcanic History of the Moon'. The STEM leaders intend to study Science post-16 and this university-style lecture was a great opportunity for them to hear from Dr Marissa Lo, a researcher working with the Volcanology, Isotope Geochemistry and Cosmochemistry groups at Manchester University. The students even received a surprise gift of refractive glasses! Another great opportunity to aspire

our gifted students. Mr Spencer and Mr Lowe really embraced the occasion.

 STEM Leaders: Our brilliant STEM Leaders continue to inspire the next generation of Scientists. On Friday 3rd November these STEM leaders planned and led a Bonfire night-themed enrichment activity. Yr7 and Yr8 students were able to conduct flame tests under their watchful guidance. In addition, Luka Anthonypillai gave a fantastic presentation about the Science behind Fireworks to a packed room, making links with the flame tests taking place and the Science curriculum. Amazing work!





• KS3 Anti Bullying Update. The theme for this year's anti-bullying awareness campaign is 'Being an Upstander' and we were delighted to welcome Lauren from OpenView Education into school who ran theatre workshops with all KS3 students. The performance explored different types of bullying, the impact of bullying, and the responsibilities of bystanders to report bullying. Our Bully Busters have been situated in the Piazza providing students with the opportunity to ask questions, get involved in activities and also fill

in an application to join the Bully Busters Team. This team is growing from strength to strength, and we are delighted to have added some new members from Yr7 after their successful applications. Remember that bullying is never acceptable at St Damian's.

- Maths Enrichment Day. This week eight Yr.10 girls attended a maths event at Xaverian College. The
 girls took part in a Psychic Workshop looking at probabilities and confidence levels. They then had the
 opportunity to meet and discuss careers using mathematics with women from the world of work. After
 lunch there was an exciting activity on Coding followed by a team competition. Everyone found the
 day challenging, fun and most importantly very informative. Mrs Marshall who accompanied them
 said they were a credit to the school.
- *Reading Groups: quick update.* These are proving a great success. As I've said previously, over 100 children are benefiting from weekly reading groups. These build confidence, expose children to increased vocabulary and help them to enjoy reading more. The ability to read and comprehend is

crucial, if children can't read, then they can't access our robust academic curriculum.

Careers Update: A group of Yr10 students attended a Theology conference at the XL academy at Ashton Sixth Form College. Students were given the opportunity to listen to a keynote speaker from the University of Leeds, discuss and debate law and philosophy and hear about what it takes to be an *'Oxbridge'* student. There will be further opportunities from January onwards in an array of different subject disciplines. We have also confirmed our attendance for an Apprenticeship and





Education Event in March for Yr10. Students will be able to find out more about apprenticeships at all levels, discover educational pathways available to them and talk to large scale employers such as Land Rover and the NHS
