The word 'advent' means 'coming'. It is a time in preparation for the celebration of the birth of Jesus. Many customs involve counting the days until Christmas begins, such as a use of a chocolate advent calendar.

Some churches have an advent wreath with five candles, one for each of the four Sundays leading up to Christmas day and one for Christmas Day self, the candles all have different symbolic meanings the first one represents God's people and is considered as the **Candle of Hope**, the second one represents The Old Testament Prophets and is considered as the **Candle of Peace**, the third one represents John the Baptist and is considered as the **Candle of Love**, and the fourth one represents Mary the Mother of Jesus and is considered as the **Candle of Joy**.

Finally, the fifth one represents the **birth of Jesus Christ** it shows us that Jesus is 'the Light of the World'. There are different readings on each one of the Sundays leading up to Christmas day.

We asked Mr Stoneley the following questions:

PAKISTAN

Floods in Pakistan

Almost 33 million people have been evacuated across Pakistan due to heavy flooding in the country. Also 27,000 schools were damaged and now 2 million children are missing out on school. The floods that occurred this summer were the biggest that Pakistan has ever experienced. Although it has been months since the floods first hit, many buildings are still waterlogged, or even underwater. Pakistan has been through extreme weather conditions that have led to the country's worst flooding in a decade. At least 1,100 people were killed by floodwaters and one third of the country in submerged in water.

The worst flooding occurred along the Indus River in the areas of Punjab, Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, Balochistan, and Sindh. Numerous public health facilities, water systems, schools and hundreds of thousands of residences have also been destroyed or damaged. Young children are exposed to a wide range of new flood-related risks and hazards, such as from damaged houses and drowning in floodwaters while living in the open with their family.

We can help by donating to charities such as the British Red Cross, UNICEF etc that are providing humanitarian relief for Pakistan delivering vaccines, medicine, mosquito nets, supplements, food, tents, drinking water etc.

The Journalism Club has recognised the natural disaster in Pakistan as something that needs to be shared so that we can raise awareness and do our bit to help.

LET'S TALK ABOUT SEND

We have introduced a SEND segment in the newspaper. SEND (Special Educational Needs and Disabilities) is at the heart of all we do at St Damian's. The school is equipped with a fantastic body of support staff that work meticulously to support and encourage our students. We would like to write about SEND in school in order to prevent stigma around SEND in society (stigma: a mark of shame that is associated with a particular characteristic or circumstance). We will be looking at various needs and disabilities in no particular order; starting with autism.

"Being autistic unfortunately means that there's stigma and misconceptions surrounding it, such as thinking that every autistic person is the same or that we need to be pitied or infantilised. When this is in fact not the case, autism is a spectrum meaning that not everybody that is autistic is different. Just because I can't stand the texture of mashed potatoes doesn't mean another autistic person will. Stereotypes and stigmas like this mean that people with autism feel the need to mask their autism; which is emotionally exhausting. Everybody should be able to embrace what makes them different." - Anonymous, Y10

"Autism affects how people communicate and interact with the world and is lifelong. Did you know that more than 1 in 100 people are on the autistic spectrum and currently there are about 700,00 autistic adults and children in the U.K. At St Damian's, all teaching and support staff had training last year about what autism is and how we can support members of the school community who are autistic. The website for the National Autistic Society is a very helpful source for information about autism www.autism.org.uk"









