## 3] St Damian's Students Crowned Clear Winners at Young Chemist Competition

On Tuesday 14th October, two of our outstanding Yr11 students, Maya Santana and Shaun Shibu, represented St Damian's at a prestigious Young Chemist event hosted by Hulme Grammar School. Competing against five other teams, including two from Hulme Grammar and one from Crompton House, our students showcased exceptional scientific skill, teamwork, and resilience. The competition featured two challenging rounds: a practical titration task involving potassium manganate and iron sulfate, followed by a demanding 20-question chemistry quiz. Maya and



Shaun excelled in both, scoring an impressive 63 points, well ahead of second place (47 points). Their performance included full marks on 12 questions and near-perfect scores on five others. This is testament to their deep understanding of science.



Mr Millington, from Hulme Grammar School, who led and organised the event said "Maya and Shaun were an absolute credit to St Damian's and in particular to their incredible science

teachers. They were clear winners of the event and worked brilliantly as a team. Their intelligence shone through and they demonstrated that rare ability amongst teenagers to show genuine

# Safeguarding Update

- ✓ UNITE. On Friday 17th October, our school successfully carried out a practice of the UNITE safety procedure, our lockdown protocol designed to ensure swift and calm action during emergencies. Students and staff responded promptly and responsibly to the simulated alert, demonstrating a clear understanding of the instructions shared earlier in assemblies. Senior Leadership Team members were stationed across the site to support and monitor the process. The drill was a valuable opportunity to reinforce our commitment to safety and preparedness, and we are proud of how our students and staff came together to support one another. - ✓ Community Police visit Y7 Assembly. This month, PC Tony Lawton, our local High Schools Engagement Officer, spoke with Yr7 students during an assembly. He introduced his role both within the school and the wider community, explaining how he is here to help keep students safe. He spoke about the importance of building trust and being a friendly, familiar face that students can turn to. As part of his visit, he also shared important advice around online safety, including how to protect yourself from cyberbullying and stay safe when using social media and digital platforms. It was a valuable assembly, and we're grateful for PC Lawton's continued support in helping our students feel safe.

As the nights draw in and seasonal events approach, it's important to stay vigilant and stay safe. Here are some key messages:

- Dark Nights. As the evenings grow darker, please ensure that your child is wearing appropriate
  clothing and are visible when walking or cycling: reflective clothing or accessories can make a
  big difference.
- Halloween Safety. We understand some of our students may choose to take part in trick-or-treating activities with their families. For those who do, we want to ensure you stay safe and respectful. Please remember to go out with a trusted adult, stick to well-lit areas, and only visit homes that are clearly welcoming trick-or-treaters. We encourage kindness, courtesy, and care for others at all times.
- Bonfire Night Safety. For safety please use organised events as public firework displays are safer and better regulated than private ones and keep your distance. Always maintain a safe space from bonfires and fireworks.

### **Teaching & Learning Update**



Mrs Heenan continues to ensure that quality teaching is at the heart of what we do. This term, we've been focusing on strengthening teaching and learning across the school through our robust appraisal system. This structured



process ensures that every teacher receives regular, supportive feedback and sets clear, measurable targets aligned with school priorities. As we look ahead to 2025 - 26, appraisal discussions are now directly linked to subject leader planning documentation, helping staff identify key development areas within their subjects and align them with whole school improvement goals. Recently, we held a work scrutiny event where staff reviewed students' books to celebrate progress and ensure consistency in standards. These activities are vital in driving high-quality teaching and learning, and we're excited to see the impact they're having across the curriculum.

For the record, this group of teachers are the **best** I have ever had the pleasure to work with. They are committed to ensuring your child achieves their potential.

### Yr11 Update

Overall, there is a mixed picture from Yr11 students. Some are working extremely hard and scoring highly in their assessments and tests. Others are just doing the minimum that is expected. However, a significant minority are not putting in the required work. They are at risk of becoming overwhelmed and this will lead to underachievement in the summer. For clarity, there is no substitute for hard work and effort. Students will 'not get what they wish for, but rather what they work for'. I ask parents to support their child in ensuring they are focused on their schoolwork. They won't regret it and they will be rewarded with great results in the summer.

Mock exams. Your child should be revising for their Mock exams which take place at the beginning of December. These grades are indicative of what they will achieve in the summer and are used by the school to support applications to College. This means that they should also be working hard during this half term.



✓ Our Year 11 Hospitality and Catering students have recently completed their practical cooking assessment, where they independently planned, prepared, and presented two dishes of their choice. Each student selected recipes that are linked to a specific task, demonstrating a strong understanding of key hospitality skills such as time management, organisation, and presentation. that reflected their individual interests and abilities. I am incredibly proud

of their commitment, effort, and professionalism during this assessment. Well done to all our Year 11 Hospitality and Catering students!

#### Yr11 Geography Field Trip



As part of the GCSE Geography course, our Yr11 students took part in a compulsory fieldtrip to Salford Quays to investigate the impacts of urban regeneration. The visit provided an excellent opportunity for students to apply classroom learning to a real-world environment. During the trip, they conducted a people count to assess footfall in different areas and created a land use map to explore how the space has changed and been redeveloped over time. These activities helped students

understand how regeneration can influence economic activity, public spaces, and community life. Mrs Spencer, Head of Geography said "The behaviour and engagement of all students were exemplary throughout the day. They worked with focus, enthusiasm, and maturity, representing the school with pride. The data collected will now be used to support their GCSE coursework and deepen their understanding of urban geography".

### **Leaning Support Clubs for Students**

✓ Social & Games Club. Learning Support staff provide a popular Social and Games Club each day at lunchtime in Room 6. Students have fun playing competitive family-favourites such as Connect Four, Uno and Guess Who? Students who prefer a quieter, relaxing time, can simply talk and draw, colour-in and sketch before returning to period 5 after lunch.



✓ Study Clubs. Homework is 'part and parcel' of learning and progress at St Damian's. The Study Clubs provided aim to help children develop good study habits and embed their learning. The Special Support Managers run Study Clubs after school on Tuesday and Wednesday from 3.10pm-4:00pm. The venues are:



- Room 19 for Year 7 9 with Miss Gardiner and Mr Wardle
- Ambrose for Year 10 with Mrs Shaw
- Room 11 for Year 11 with Mrs Burrows and Mrs Walthew



Each venue has computer access, and staff are on-hand to support students with completion of homework, or with revision. Students can drop into the club, complete what they need to do and then go home. They do not have to attend on both days and do not have to stay until 4:00pm. Attending Study Club is a great way to stay on top of homework and avoid it building up. There is no need to struggle at home, when there is help onhand.

### ASPIRE Day...enhancing students' Personal Development



Our first ASPIRE Day of the year was a powerful and thought-provoking experience for our school community, highlighting the importance of living out core British values such as respect, tolerance,



democracy, and the rule of law. Through a range of engaging workshops and discussions, students explored what it means to be a good citizen - someone who actively contributes to their community with compassion and integrity. We reflected on the difference between free speech and hate speech, learning how to express ourselves respectfully while standing up against discrimination. Sessions on drug and alcohol awareness helped us understand the risks and responsibilities













involved in making healthy life choices. We also learned about child criminal exploitation and how to recognise and resist manipulation, as well as the



importance of kindness, whether through daily acts of service

or by advocating for animal rights and environmental care. Overall, the day encouraged us to be positive role models who lead by example and use our voices and actions to build a safer, more caring society for everyone. Our students showed great maturity and respect, with guests

commenting on the outstanding behaviour displayed and purposeful atmosphere in school. With special thanks to all our guests who helped to support the day.

Pastoral Theme: Hope Mr Carty's form, Yr9ACY, as part of this half term's theme of HOPE explored what 'hope' meant to them. Linking to the 'monkey's paw' story that we had been reading as part of the literacy sessions, we focused on the idea of wishes and how they could be selfish or charitable in nature.

From our discussion, and as a symbol of hope, the message in a bottle idea

formed. Each child in the form wrote messages and placed in a bottle to be read when they are in Year11.



These messages had a focus on friends, family, or other people in the world that may be struggling. Each note was private, sealed immediately and placed in the bottle. The students discussed that these messages might reach God, drawing parallels with personal prayers of hope. This is a great example of a form embracing the Friday pastoral theme sessions to really good effect.

To continue the theme of hope, the form are learning basic sign language (Elisa Santana's idea), and Anthony Skelly shared a speech with the group, to raise

awareness for breast cancer. These ideas are entirely student led. As a school community, we believe that hope is a pre-requisite for St Damian's being a special place.

#### Walk & Talk Group



Our Wellbeing Walk & Talk group takes place every Wednesday lunchtime supported by Mrs Harrison and Mrs Hunter our two experienced school Student Support Officers. This initiative has

been developed to encourage positive mental health and wellbeing along with building new friendships. On these

walks, students are not just covering ground; they are growing in confidence, resilience, and perspective whilst mixing with peers from other year groups. This also gives our students the opportunity to develop their communication skills by engaging in respectful and thoughtful discussions whilst walking in a safe place.



### Sustainability at St Damian's... looking to the future

The importance of sustainability and looking to the future is important for this community. As such, I am delighted to introduce our new Sustainability and Stewardship Lead, Mr Stoneley, who will be championing our Climate Action Plan, along with a group of dedicated members of Sustainability Committee including our Eco Club lead Mrs Lowe, and Business Manager, Mrs Ogden.











The aim of our Sustainability Committee is to foster a culture of environmental responsibility across our school community through promoting sustainable practices, supporting student-led initiatives like the Eco Club, and aligning with the values of 'Laudato Si'. The committee will integrate climate awareness into everyday school life. There will be an opportunity for students to become 'SEED Young Changemaker' to take part in real-world projects that support our Climate Action Plan and Eco Club, turning ideas into impactful change which will support students with Post 16 options and future careers. Collectively, this empowers our students and



staff to take meaningful action, reduce our ecological footprint, and contribute to building a more just and sustainable world; starting right here in our local community with our 'Preloved Uniform Pop-Up Shop'.

### Certificate Evening: The record breaking class of 2025!






