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GIFT Team Focus. As we are now in the final term there are new GIFT



As always, new members are welcome. As part of our connection to the local parish, each Wednesday at breaktime Sister Rosaline will

lead '*Time out with God*' which is a special voluntary liturgy that takes place in the chapel with Sr Roseline. This has been well attended and we encourage everyone to attend at least once per term.

 Global Learning. Yr7 are currently studying the newly written curriculum "To know you more clearly". Our focus for this term has been to produce a group presentation and charity campaign for Aid to the Church in Need. Yr7 have been outstanding in delivering hard hitting campaigns, raising the profile on persecution around the world and producing excellent ways we can make a differencer such as prayer, petitions and charity events.



Yr7 Curriculum. To support RE in their evaluation of this newly written curriculum, the Teaching and Learning team observed four Yr7 lessons and I am delighted to report that the feedback was



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fantastic. An ambitious curriculum is being delivered and is reflected in the fact the students were able to demonstrate a depth of knowledge through evaluation and analysis of the units' key topics. The 'Big Question' guided the units and allowed for a very developed understanding across all the units delivered so far. Highly accurate use of key concepts and instance by staff to link to sources of authority. Staff were knowledgeable and it was evident that high quality CPD was at the core of the departments planning.

- Careers in RE. To support our students in their future careers the RE department planned and developed a careers lesson. Using the CAFOD game 'FLOOD' students had to work in teams to make quick decisions to save lives in a 'flood'. They had to manage funds and make strategic decisions. This demonstrated that by studying RE and being introduced to global learning the students can build on their transferable skills. At the end of the lesson students looked at roles working for CAFOD, with jobs in the UK and around the world. This broadened their understanding of how charities operate to help others.
- Update on Lenten Walk. I am proud to announce that The Big Lent Walk 2024 was a huge success! Together as a school community, we've raised an incredible £884.25! Thank you for your generous donations supporting CAFOD in their fight against poverty. Let's keep walking towards a brighter future together! A massive thanks to Mrs Jinks who organised [and participated ^(C)] in the 'Walk'.



• Yr11 Revision. The Easter holiday gave the students time to revise the more challenging evaluation topics. The engagement of the students was strong as shown by the RE staff receiving practice question answers from students who were working at home. The RE staff were very proud of their efforts. Educating and Safeguarding our Yr9 Students on 'Exploitation'

We live in a world where children are exploited in a number of ways. Sadly, our great students are not immune to this possibility and as a school that prides itself on a holistic education, we seek opportunities to educate on this 'real' issue our students may face in their future. Last week Yr9 students enjoyed a live performance from 'Oddarts' theatre group who delivered an interactive theatre performance and workshop using specialist facilitators to explore key issues around exploitation and serious youth violence. The aims of the session were to increase awareness and recognise warning signs for exploitation/grooming, reduce the risk of violence and harmful behaviours, and explore safety and prevention strategies including how to get help. Students took part in discussion exercises and engagement with actors in order to search for solutions. Following on from this, students enjoyed a post-performance discussion to explore triggers, warning signs and signposting to support services. The actors were impressed and commented on how wonderful the students were *"showing great maturity in their questioning and answers and their behaviour was superb."* Well done to Yr9 and thanks to Mrs Taylor, our PSHE co-ordinator, for organising.

Yr11 Update

As I write this it is only a few days away from the official start of the GCSE exams. I am very proud of my great staff here who have all 'gone the extra mile' in the true spirit of the 'St Damian's Way' to prepare them to be successful. I am equally delighted that the vast majority of students have responded well to this genuine support. I hope that you get what you deserve on results day in August. A few updates for your perusal.



- *Easter Revision:* Feedback indicated this was a huge success. The maturity of the students who attended bodes well for their results in August. In a recent assembly, I shared the many positive teacher comments.
- ✓ Intervention before exams: We have continued after school revision sessions over the past few weeks but a new after school intervention schedule will be issued to students for when the exams start.
- Independent learning: It is important your children continue to work hard at home, follow a routine and keep the momentum going. From experience, before you know it, 'the exams are over'.
- *Expectations*: Our expectations of students behaviour and following the rules over the next few months will continue. This includes, for example, punctuality, no jewellery and wearing the correct uniform.
- ✓ Attendance. As I have said before, there is a strong correlation between attendance and attainment. In essence, poor or irregular attendance results in lower GCSE outcomes. The aim must be 100% attendance.
- Leavers Mass: The date has yet to be confirmed. Five years ago students had a welcome Mass and it is fitting that they have a leavers Mass. Watch this space!
- Study Leave: There is no planned study leave and the expectation is that your child is in school as normal until their final date is decided.
- ✓ *Stress:* This can be a stressful time, but we have lots of support in place, including strong pastoral systems. I ask that parents look out for signs of stress and support your child through the next few weeks.
- Prom: Invitations were sent out to all students who have met the 'criteria' that has been set out since September. This was simple and transparent. No more than one exclusion, good attendance, good punctuality and completion of all work
- ✓ *Believe to Achieve.* This is the mantra we try to instil. Students who have belief and confidence are more likely to achieve or surpass their targets. Students must remain positive during the exam period, believe in themselves and take one exam at a time.



Goldsmiths' Award for Community Engagement – FINALISTS I am delighted to announce that St



Damian's have reached the national finals of the 'Goldsmiths' Awards for Community Engagement'. After attending the virtual heats, students had to deliver a presentation and be interviewed in front of a panel of judges. Mrs Gerschler was very impressed with our students and proudly said to me "they smashed it!". The judges said that the standard of the submissions this year for the Awards was extremely high and



determining which entrants should proceed to the National Final was not easy. We are now one of

just eight schools to make it through to the Final. The students, accompanied by Mrs Gerschler will attend the National Final at the Goldsmiths' Hall in London on Tuesday 25th June 2024. Watch this space. On a personal level, I was extremely impressed by the maturity and confidence of our great children. It was truly humbling and is a major reason why St Damian's is



such a special place. The joy on their faces when they found out they were through to the final was a joy to behold.
