





A Message from our Headteacher

It gives me great pleasure to introduce you to our first ever Alumni Newsletter. At St Damian's our Mission Statement is clear. It is to develop the whole child so that they leave our community as happily educated citizens ready to positively contribute to the common good of society. A strategically focused careers plan is integral to this. I am extremely proud to say that our careers provision, spear-headed by Mrs Henshaw, is simply exceptional.

And that brings me to say a few words about what our provision has entailed over the past few years. This has been comprehensive and permeates all years and the mantra is *'it's not just for Year 11 pupils'* is plain to see.

We have had a plethora of external employers in the school over the years which included well-known companies like Rolls Royce, Cadent and NatWest. These are massive companies and reflects our ambitions to ensure that our pupils have suitable experiences of potential employers. During National Careers Week pupils are given opportunities to develop their entrepreneurship skills through, for example Dragon's Den or the Apprentice. Part of our ASPIRE days focus on learning about Sixth Form Colleges or local apprenticeships. All of this is complemented by real life experiences. For example, Year 9 pupils have visited the University of Bolton and many of our Year 10 pupils partake in 'raising aspirations' programmes run by Ashton and Loreto Sixth Forms. To move to the next stage, we are going to be promoting work experience for Year 10 pupils.

The impact of this comprehensive provision is two-fold. Firstly, pupils are able to make informed decisions and choices about their futures. Secondly, we raise pupils' aspirations through educating them on the importance of learning and achieving their potential in school. As a school community we are proud that we have a low NEET figure, reflecting the fact that pupils have had independent and impartial career guidance. We have also amassed a range of accolades including achieving Stage Three of the IAG award and the National 'Most Progress of a School' at the Careers and Enterprise Awards. These demonstrate, if needed, our commitment to Careers education.

As the purpose of this Newsletter is to highlight and celebrate the Careers of our Alumni, I pay tribute to Careers that I believe should be recognised at this time; these are nurses, teachers and the police. These professions are classed as key workers. Nurses, during this Global Pandemic, have been on the front-line along with others working in the NHS ensuring that they are saving lives. In this inaugural Alumni Newsletter, we feature Olivia Billings, who was part of the class of 2011, who works at Tameside General Hospital. Secondly, I have to say a few words about teachers. Teachers, alongside the many support staff have continued, against all odds to keep schools open to educate pupils and keep them safe. St Damian's recognises the outstanding hard work and dedication of all the key workers in our Alumni who have worked tirelessly to support others in our communities both at local, regional & national level. A huge thank you to you all. You have been truly inspirational! We asked some of our Alumni to share their experiences during the pandemic. We have had a fantastic response from the police, health & education. Thank you to those of you who have shared your experiences with us.

Primary Teacher

What does your role involve? My role involves delivering a curriculum and providing a learning environment that will inspire, excite and nurture children through a crucial stage in their development. I aim to provide experiences that will develop children's curiosity and knowledge about the world around them. Although I now specialise in Early Years, my three years teacher training equipped me with the essential skills and knowledge to teach all areas of the curriculum. I am responsible for leading Religious Education across school. This involves ensuring the effective delivery of the RE curriculum across all year groups as well as working closely with Father Simon to support children on their own personal faith journey.

What advice would you give to pupils considering a career in your profession?

Get involved with as much voluntary work in schools as you can. You can do this by contacting primary schools in your local area. Try to get experience across different year groups to find the age range you would love to teach. Take up leadership opportunities in school such as becoming a prefect to build your confidence and help you find your voice. Try to find new hobbies that will push you out of your comfort zone and broaden your life experience.

What have been the challenges of working during the COVID-19 pandemic?

Teaching in Early Years is an interactive experience between the teachers, pupils and learning environment. Children are encouraged to follow their own interests and take control of their own learning. It has been difficult to provide the unique learning experience online that we are

used sharing in to а learning classroom environment. Some of the activities that are so essential and so well loved in Early Years such as singing have now been limited due to COVID-19 restrictions. As a school community, we love to welcome parents and carers into our classroom to strengthen home school links and share liqua achievements. We have found alternative ways for parents to be involved in their children's journey through school.

What have been the positives of working during the COVID-19 pandemic?

We have come together more as a school community to overcome the difficulties that COVID-19 has brought us. As a school we have placed the wellbeing of staff, pupils and their families at the centre of all we do. We believe that happy learners make successful learners.

Finally, what did you enjoy most as a pupil at St. Damian's?

St Damian's gave me so many opportunities outside of the school curriculum that built my confidence and inspired me to achieve. I made the most of Drama, Music and PE extracurricular opportunities that gave me personal skills that I am now able to draw upon when teaching in the classroom. I particularly loved Science at St Damian's as I was taught by staff who showed such passion for their subject, inspiring me to do the same.

Police Officer

What does your role involve?

As a frontline police officer, I respond to emergency calls from members of the public. Our primary role is to protect the public and ensure the law is applied.

What advice would you give to pupils considering a career in your profession?

I would very much encourage anybody who is considering a career in policing to sign up as a special constable or join as a PCSO to get a flavour of what the role entails. The role is both challenging yet rewarding and is different each day

What have been the challenges of working during the COVID-19 pandemic?

At a time when the police service is already facing the challenge of responding to high demand with fewer resources, they were tasked with the key role of educating the public in the importance of adhering to the COVID-19 restrictions and enforcing the legislation in relation this where to necessary. This placed a huge extra pressure on the service, as the existing demand / usual work of a police officer still needed to be completed. As the pandemic continues and prolonged further. more restrictions are put in place, the public are becoming increasingly frustrated with the additional rules and this has resulted in a small number of people who have challenged the rules and the police.

This has brought with it, its own set of issues for the police to deal with and balancing the public health requirements with the need to maintain public trust has been a continuing and evolving challenge.

What have been the positives of working during the COVID-19 pandemic?

The appreciation shown by members of the public towards key workers has been a rewarding part of working through the pandemic. Working through the pandemic has also been a welcome distraction from missing family members from other households who I have been unable to see due to the COVID-19 restrictions.

Finally, what did you enjoy most as a pupil at St. Damian's?

I thoroughly enjoyed my time at St Damian's, the staff within the school were excellent and I had a very wide circle of friends who made me look forward to going to school. The people what makes are any establishment what it is and the people at St Damian's certainly make it a very special place. I have very fond memories of my time there.

Critical Care Nurse

What does your role involve?

My role as a Critical Care Nurse involves caring for patients who are very sick requiring high dependency care and ongoing medical attention in order to keep them stable and alive. My role entails working within a highly pressurised environment, making detailed head to toe assessments of the patients, administering crucial medication, overseeing and ensuring the correct use of life support machines such as ventilators, assisting doctors when carrying out high risk procedures, and monitoring the observations of the patient. I am responsible for the overall needs of my patients whilst admitted onto our unit such as maintaining their hygiene, feeding, and managing their overall comfort.

What advice would you give to pupils considering a career in your profession?

To work within the Nursing profession, I would highly recommend that you work hard and push yourself to the best of your abilities in your GCSEs. If you are considering doing A Levels. I would definitelv recommend studying Biology as it would give you an overall grounded knowledge of a huge part of the profession before starting your Degree. I would recommend picking up voluntary work within both the hospital and community setting if possible, and if possible, working as a worker alongside support registered nurses to grasp an understanding of the career you are going into. I would certainly advise pupils to pursue their career in nursing if they are passionate about helping people the way I am, as it can be a very emotionally tough job but also an extremely rewarding one.

What have been the challenges of working during the Covid 19 pandemic?

For me one of the main challenges of being a frontline worker during the being pandemic was deployed to work on Critical Care with no previous experience within that field of Nursing at that time. In addition to being a new member of staff on the unit and looking after the critically unwell which was a new challenge in itself to me, myself and my team also faced the worry of catching the infection ourselves and bringing it home to our families, knowing that the infection can affect some people a lot worse than others. We have to wear Personal Protective Equipment (PPE). There was a national shortage of PPE during the first wave of Covid 19 which was also a huge worry. As front-line workers it was also a huge challenge enforcing social distancing in and out of the work environment. Some of the staff on our unit had to isolate on their own for a huge amount of time away from their families who were at risk of catching Covid 19.



What have been the positives of working during the Covid 19 pandemic?

There has certainly been a lot of positives to take from working as a front line worker during the pandemic such as learning lots of new skills as a registered Nurse and also feeling well respected by members of the general public within the profession. Patients that have got better have had the upmost praise and are very grateful for the care we have given from admission to discharge, also relatives and friends of our service users are very thankful to us which is very rewarding.

Finally, what did you enjoy most as a pupil at St.Damian's?

I enjoyed a range of subjects including Science and English Literature which I feel have been very beneficial to my career. My favourite subject was Religious Studies, I feel having a particular interest in this subject has helped me be understanding and empathetic towards my patients in my job today! I didn't achieve the highest grades but with the help of my amazing teachers and a career goal set in my head, I made sure I did everything I could, to get to the career I am in today.



St Damian's Staff has many Alumni actively serving in the school. This demonstrates that the strong attachment and love of the school that has continued to grow from time as a pupil at St. Damian's to time as an employee ensuring that the next generations of St. Damian's pupils continue to grow, develop and be inspired by the unique ethos of St. Damian's Catholic Community.

In the inaugural Alumni Newsletter, Miss Joyce shares her journey from St. Damian's pupil to Assistant Headteacher at St. Damian's.

Having first walked through the doors as an 11-year-old girl in September 1990, returning as a Newly Qualified Teacher in September 2002, felt like coming home. As a pupil, I had always embraced life at St. Damian's. I enjoyed all subjects, I was selected for the school Netball team, and loved being a part of numerous plays and assemblies. The pinnacle of all these things of course and for every pupil at St. Damian's in the 1990's... The Year 11 Christmas concert! Every year group trying to 'out do' its predecessor! Life at St. Damian's in the 1990's felt like a place of opportunity, excitement and fun.

In September 1995, I started at Ashton 6th Form and studied Biology, Chemistry and English Language A Levels. Here, I made lots of new friends but still maintained friendships with 3 girls who I attended St. Damian's with. I really enjoyed all 3 of my A –Levels. Initially I decided to read Law at the University of Liverpool. Then I changed my mind.

Having spent the Christmas break researching different Science based degrees, I re applied to read Biomedical Science at the University of Manchester in January 1998 and started the course the following September.

In the final year of my degree, I had to complete a research project. By this point, I knew that becoming a research scientist was not something I aspired to be, so I selected an education-based project which involved working with primary school children. This, along with returning St. Damian's to choreograph 'Bugsy Malone,' in December 2000, cemented my desire to teach. (Along with a few encouraging words from Mr. Tuck ^(C))





Life as a teacher at St. Damian's has been interesting. Teachers who once inspired me to have a love of their subject, suddenly becoming my colleagues and coaching me in a completely different way. Pupils who even after 18 years and the ability to leave you speechless either with their brilliance or fragilities. Having moved through the ranks from an NQT to a Head of Year, Head of Science to an Assistant Headteacher, St. Damian's is still a place that challenges and rewards me, daily in the same way as it did as when I was a pupil.

Having worked under 4 different Headteachers, I have been part of its evolution from a 'good school to a great school.' But in the last 30 years, 2 things at St. Damian's have remained the same...

- St. Damian's is a part of me; I went for another job once and cried in the interview at the prospect of leaving!
- St. Damian's is and always has been about the pupils, which is why everyone I meet with any connection to St. Damian's talks of it being a 'special place'.

This is the same for all pupils past and present at St. Damian's. This is why I am still friends with the 3 girls who were my best friends when I was a pupil. St. Damian's is more than just a place to obtain GCSEs. It's a place where lifelong friendships are made, memories are formed, and life lessons are learned. Having spent a total of 23 years of my life being a part of St. Damian's, I now have to accept what a former teacher and colleague told me when I walked into the staff room 18 years ago...

'Maria, you are a St. Damian's lifer!'
