The Catholic Life of the School

In the last few weeks of the last academic year, we continued with the formation of our students and staff.

The following outlines these opportunities;

Retreat Day: Welcoming JUST YOUTH into our community for our Yr8 students to experience a Catholic retreat day. Students reflected on their own faith and how we are created in the image of God. Father Joel was very impressed with the respectful behaviour and exceptional engagement of our students.

Staff Formation and Pilgrimage: Last July, staff completed a 'Walk for Creation' up to Hartshead Pike.



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Using resources from Salford Diocese, our intention was to raise awareness of the challenges facing our common home, enjoy opportunities for prayer, reflect and support our Beewell initiative in school. Staff gathered for prayers in the Chapel and then walked in silence to the top of Hartshead Pike. At the top we gathered for a prayer, before descending for refreshments and a closing prayer. This was a great opportunity for staff to bond and reflect on our Mission. Our formation focus has been Catholic Social Teaching and this event linked with Participation, Stewardship, Care for Common Home, and Solidarity.

Share Day July 2023. Yet another fantastic day for both students and staff that showcased the strength of our community. It celebrated the



end of another highly successful year whilst raising monies for those who are less fortunate. The theme this year was Diamond Jubilee Festival marking 60 years of the St Damian's community. It was embraced wholeheartedly we were able to raise an

incredible £5,461.00 for our chosen charities which were Reuben's Retreat, 60 for The Christie and Emmaus, Mossley.

September Staff Liturgy: Our new academic year started with the theme "Refocus on your vocation". The reading from St Paul directed us to act on the grace that God has given us, in this reading we hear a reflection of the St Damian's Way, "if it is serving, then serve; if it is teaching, then teach; if it is to encourage, then give encouragement; if it is giving, then give generously; if it is to lead, do it diligently; if













it is to show mercy, do it cheerfully." As we start the year our staff will act of the message of fraternity from Pope Francis and build friendship and support among our community.

Finally, this year we have been notified that we are due to an external catholic inspectorate inspection. We were last inspected in March 2016 when we were awarded **outstanding in all 7** categories. As a fiercely proud catholic school we are looking forward to welcoming the inspection team to St Damian's as an opportunity to showcase an outstanding catholic community.

Safeguarding

Staff and students have been updating their knowledge about how to **stay safe online** this half term. Technology rapidly develops, and although the internet/social media can enhance our daily lives we must continue to remain vigilant about the harm that can be caused through computer misuse. Staff have been updating their knowledge of monitoring and filtering systems in school in line with the expectations of KCSIE, including understanding their roles to 'teach, notify and report' to maximise online safety. Students have had assemblies with a focus on the 4Cs: **Contact, Conduct, Content and Commerce**. This is an effective way to teach them how to be aware of who they interacting with online, assessing if content is appropriate and making sure that they are behaving in an acceptable manner. GCSE Results: The Class of 2023

I am delighted to report that our GCSE outcomes are again **well above** both Tameside and National Averages. St Damian's was, once again, one of the highest achieving schools in Tameside and indeed TOP in many headline measures, such as the Ebacc qualification and Attainment 8. Both of these performance indicators measure how well students attained across a broad range of academic subjects. As a proud and consistently high achieving community, the Governors, staff and I are extremely proud of these fantastic results which are not only the direct result of quality teaching and high expectations, but also the commitment and hard work of the students and support from parents! The results were even more impressive considering that the national picture showed a drop in outcomes. It is always a joy to see so many happy children and parents on results day! In summary, the GCSE outcomes of the class of 2023 are befitting of an outstanding school! I will update parents again when the official results are published by the Government.

Yr11: Key Messages

A massive thank you to all the parents who attended the Parental Information Evening on Monday. I cannot stress the importance of parental support for your child's success. I reiterate key messages here for your perusal.

- Attendance. There is a strong correlation between achievement and attendance. Please ensure that your child has great attendance. Students rarely 'catch-up' on work missed.
- Hard Work. There is no substitute for hard work. From experience, students who work hard achieve well.
 I expect students to be doing at least 2 hours a night including weekends.
- Mock Exams: These start on the 27th November. Students should be revising for these. Having routines and a revision timetable is vital. I ask that parents support and encourage your child by, for example, ensuring a quiet place to study.
- Yr11 Prom: This is a key event in the St Damian's calendar. However, it is not an automatic right as it is
 not a curriculum entitlement. In essence it is invitation only and reserved for students who work hard,
 attend school regularly and follow our simple rules. If a child is suspended twice, the invitation is
 automatically withdrawn.

The teachers are working very hard on behalf of your children. It is important that students realise that there is **no substitute for hard work**. This is a critical factor in their success next August.















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I would like to introduce you to several new staff as well as update you on those staff whose job roles have changed. We have the following new subject leaders: Miss Price in Maths, Mrs Baynham in Science, Mrs D'Rozario in Technology and Mr Tabas in Computer Science. We welcome back Miss Hogan as teacher of Science, who will also be the Head of Year 7, Mr Lowe, a new Science Teacher and Miss Mayoh as an ECT in Maths. Miss MacDonald will join us as a new Learning Support Assistant and Miss Hibbert will join our admin team as Receptionist. I know that you will wish them all well in their new roles. I also, wish them every success, and I have no doubt that they will be great additions to the great staff at St Damian's.

B] Curriculum Subject: Spotlight on English

The English Faculty were delighted with the GCSE outcomes. A record number of students secured at least a 'strong' grade (grade 5 or higher), along with an incredible 19 grade 9s across the two subjects! This is testament to the dedication of staff and the exceptional hard work and resilience of our students. The department comprises of an eclectic mix of enthusiasm, experience and expertise. We are very fortunate to have an AQA Literature Paper 1 Team Leader and SENDCo in our department that adds to the strength of the team. A number of colleagues have worked at our wonderful school for over a decade and some are former students! As a team we aim to inspire your child to become a life-long reader and encourage them to express themselves through the medium of the written word. We are

















looking forward to sharing another successful academic year in the company of our fantastic St Damian's students.

C] Stretching our Key Stage Four students in Maths

In the 2023 exams, we entered students for the AQA Level 2 **Further Maths** qualification, designed to stretch and challenge our more able students. It also bridged the gap for students who wanted to study A-Level Maths. Ten students sat the qualification, and they achieved really impressive results with 100% achieving Grade 9-6 and 50% achieving Grade 9-8. Furthermore, the course supported students in maximising their potential in the Maths GCSE with 5 Grade 9s and 5 Grade 8s. These are outstanding results. As the new academic year begins, we hope to build on last year's success. Currently we have 20 Yr11 and 38 Yr10 students attending this excellent extra-curricular opportunity. A massive thanks to both Mr Willerton and Mr Wilson for leading on this initiative.

D] Our Cultural Capital 'Curriculum' [CCC]

At St Damian's we immerse our students in many rich experiences to build their 'cultural capital'. This is simply exposing our students to a range of experiences, activities and knowledge that ensures that they can confidently and competently talk about the world in which they live. The first learning experience will be led by the Technology department, showcasing the best of British food during British food week, or look out for MFL celebrating European Day of Languages at the start of October hosting a 'Pintxo' party and tasting German food! E] Reports

Yrs7-10 students will be receiving a 'Standard's Checkpoint' towards the end of October. This is a quick snapshot of how your child has started the year at St Damian's in terms of trying their best with classwork and homework and their behaviour in lessons. Parents should ask; Are the gradings mainly 'Always' or 'Often'? Please praise your child if they are- it means they are meeting our standards. Are any subjects graded as 'Sometimes' or 'Rarely''? If there are, please discuss this with your child. What are the reasons for this? What can your child do to improve? How can you support them? Yr11 will be receiving a similar report, but it will include Current working grade and Predicted Grades.

"Special Educational Needs and Disabilities: Information for Students

As part of our commitment to supporting personal development, being inclusive and celebrating diversity, the Literacy Hub's range of books about special educational needs and disabilities has been extended. They are currently displayed at the entrance of the hub. Student-friendly books are available, for example, about Autism, ADHD, Dyslexia, Dyspraxia. Please encourage your child to borrow one of the books if they would like to find out more about common additional needs.



Reading Groups

As a school we understand that the ability to read is fundamental to accessing the academic knowledge rich curriculum that we provide at St Damian's. Over 110 students are in these reading groups. Below is a synopsis of these groups;

- I am reading 'Jekyll and Hyde' to 10 Yr8 boys. My aim is to build their confidence while also increasing their reading skills, vocabulary and general cultural capital.
- Mrs Brophy is reading 'The Firework Maker's Daughter' to support the development of new vocabulary.
 Mrs Heenan is reading 'Abomination' by Robert Swindells, with a Yr8 group. Her aim is to increase their reading fluency and confidence with reading out loud.
- Ms Joyce is reading 'A.N.T.I.D.O.T.E' to a group of Yr9 students to help these pupils develop a love of reading, whilst helping to grow their imagination.







- Mrs Walker is reading 'I am the Minotaur' with selected Yr10 SEND pupils, ensuring a focus on improving their reading skills for the demands of KS4.
- Mrs McArdle is reading 'Lord of the Flies' with a Yr7 group of exceptional readers. The challenging vocabulary in this text will deepen their knowledge of tier 2 words.
- Ms Toole is reading 'Wink' with a group of Yr7, an emotional story that will develop pupils' empathetic skills.

Our fantastic LSAs will also be running some targeted small group intervention to increase reading fluency, and some one-to-one reading with individual pupils.

Extra-Curricular Clubs

As part of our ongoing commitment to raise attainment and build confidence we have a range of clubs. These support our students socially, emotionally and academically. Your child will know if they have to attend these.

A] Study Clubs: Year groups every Tuesday

- Yr7: Support with organisation and independence as they start secondary school. [Room 25]
- Yr8: Raising aspirations of and helping them form positive relationships in school. [Room 13]
- Yr9: Supporting students with independent learning strategies. [Room 19]

Yr10: Ensuring preparation for GCSE demands including learning how to study effectively. [Room 28]

Yr11: A focused intervention group. An excellent opportunity for students to boost their learning skills and support to prepare for Mock exams in November. [Room 40]

I ask that parents support the school and ensure that your child attends the above study clubs if selected.

B] Lunchtime Clubs

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Games and Card Club. A place where students can socialise and play a range of popular card or board games. They build resilience when the game does not go their way, develop strategies to out-think their opponents and develop communication and social skills whilst having fun.



✓ Key Stage 3 Social Club. This club aims to increase students' confidence through providing a safe space for children to come together and informally chat and play games as a group.



Mindful Drawing Club. This club offers a calm place of peace throughout lunchtime and is popular with students who want to have a quiet break from the more active outside spaces and competitive games and

card club. Relaxing music creates a soothing atmosphere.

C] Homework/Study Clubs for Pupils with Additional Needs

Homework and Study Clubs have been launched for students with additional needs in each year group. Parents of students who would benefit from this support have already received texts and parents of Yr7 students involved have also received a letter, but here is a reminder of when and where they are:

Key Stage 3	Room 19	Tuesday and Wednesday 3.10pm-4pm
Year 10	Ambrose (staircase side)	Tuesday and Wednesday 3.10pm-4pm
Year 11	Room 11	Tuesday and Wednesday 3.10pm 4pm

Each room has computer facilities. Students do not have to attend both weekly sessions and can choose how long they stay for, depending on the work they have to complete. Attending the clubs will help establish good
















routines and the extra support of staff is reassuring for many students. Last year, the purposeful atmosphere in the clubs was a joy to behold.

Parental Evenings

Over the past few weeks we have engaged parents with three parental information evenings that are designed to impart pertinent information to each year group. In the Yr11 presentation there was a focus on revision and the importance of working hard both at home and school. Yr10 focused on the importance of good study habits in Yr10 and the additional opportunities open to them with regards to work experience and pupil leadership and in the Yr9 presentation the focus was on standards and expectations, with the increasing demand of the final year of KS3. This year group will be making option choices for their desired pathways as they move towards GCSEs.

Yr8 parental evening will take place on Thursday 12th October. I ask that parents make every opportunity to attend as working together is the best way to ensure your child fulfils their potential.

Year 7 parents will have the opportunity to meet form tutors during the next half term.

St Damian's Standards and our 5 Simple Rules

At the beginning of the year, it is appropriate to outline our simple, transparent, fair rules which we enforce. This ensures that we have a safe, thriving community. As Headteacher, I am very proud that the vast majority of our students behave and are true ambassadors for our community. At St Damian's we have 5 simple rules that underpin all we do. Briefly, these are as follows;

- Correct Uniform. Our students should be proud to attend St Damian's and wearing the correct uniform is
 the most outwardly sign of this. This includes no jewellery, no earrings, no make-up, no fake tan and no
 false nails or nail varnish. Girls' skirts should be a decent length. Extreme hair styles are also not
 permitted. Hair should be natural looking and not too short. This is not an exhaustive list.
- Mobile Phones. These are NOT allowed in school at any time of the day. Students MUST not use their
 phones until they exit the green gate. If caught using them, which is rare, they will be confiscated and
 parents will collect from reception
- 3. Chewing Gum: NOT allowed in school as we want a clean and tidy environment. Chewing gum will be confiscated and a detention will be issued.
- 4. Eating 'Zones': To keep the environment tidy for your children there are areas in school where no eating is permitted: these will be clearly sign-posted. Food will be confiscated where this happens.
- 5. The 5th rule is respect. This means respecting your peers, all adults and the environment. This is our core value.

Students who consistently undermine the above rules put their place at St Damian's at risk.

Detentions

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Unfortunately, there are times when students don't make the right choice and, as a result, they may be issued with an afterschool detention. These are not optional for students if given and I politely ask that parents support us. We endeavour to give 24 hours' notice via text, but as Headteacher, I reserve the right to keep students on the same day. Obviously, if your child follows our 5 simple rules, there will be no need for a detention to be given. 'Refusal' to attend the detention is defiance and is likely to result in a suspension.
